This letter is in response to your *revised* Application for Project Authorization (Application) for the Glen Ridge Station Stair Repair Project. The **Glen Ridge Railroad Station**, Glen Ridge Borough, Essex County, was listed in the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places on 3/17/1984 and 6/22/1984, respectively. I note that this Application supersedes a previous Application approved by this office in 2011 (HPO-J2011-050 PROD). The project had to be revised as the extent of deterioration and safety concerns was greater than previously understood.

The project proposes replacing the stairs that lead from the street level to the westbound platform. All elements of the station show advanced deterioration. The stringers, railing and columns will be replaced in-kind. The wood treads (not original) also exhibit deterioration and will be replaced with stainless steel elements (the original treads were cast iron). The stair canopy will be removed during construction and reinstalled. A steel structural support system installed approximately 15-20 years ago will be removed as it will no longer be necessary.

The Application has been determined to be **technically and professionally complete** and sufficient on June 27, 2012, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 7:4 – 7.2 (a). Because, as described in the submitted Application, the project appears to conform to the *Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties (Standards)*, the project does not constitute an encroachment upon the Glen Ridge Railroad Station and may proceed pursuant to N.J.A.C. 7:4 – 7.2 (d). This notice announces the initiation of a State and Federal cost shared Feasibility level study to determine if flood risk management opportunities are advisable for the Passaic River Watershed, New Jersey and New York. The New York District Corps of Engineers and the State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) will be hosting public information sessions to discuss the scope, schedule and cost of the Passaic River Reevaluation. We respectfully request your participation in this process and your attendance at the public information sessions. The first public session will be held on July 11, 2012 from 6-9 pm at Pequannock Township High School, 85 Sunset Road, Pompton Plains, New Jersey. The second public session will be held on September 13, 2012 from 6-9 pm at the Passaic County Public Safety Academy, 300 Oldham Road, Wayne, New Jersey.

In accordance with the January 2011 Report to the Governor: Recommendations of the Passaic River Basin Flood Advisory Commission, the re-evaluation will be limited to investigations of the following items:

- 1. Levee/Floodwall/Nonstructural/Bridge & Dam Modification Alternative
- 2. Levee/Floodwall/Nonstructural/Channel Modification Alternative
- 3. The Passaic/Pompton River Dual Inlet Diversion Tunnel Alternative
- 4. Beatties Dam/Two Bridges improvements Modifications to Beatties Dam, channel improvements both downstream and upstream (including the Two Bridges Area) will be evaluated
- 5. 10 year non-structural As part of a complete alternatives analysis, a non-structural only alternative will be analyzed. This measure will be examined throughout the Passaic Basin and may include (but not limited to) flood proofing, elevating structures above the 10 year storm event, buyouts, preservation of open space, etc.
- 6. No Action Plan as required by NEPA and other regulations, the No Action Plan will be identified and the impacts will be clearly discussed and analyzed.

Flooding has long been a problem in the Passaic River Basin. The most severe flood, the "flood of record," occurred in 1903, and more recent floods in 1968, 1971, 1972, 1973, two in 1975, 1984, 1992, 1999, 2005, April 2007, March 2010 and most recently Tropical Storm Irene/Lee in August/September 2011 were sufficiently devastating to warrant Federal Disaster declarations. The most recent event, Tropical Storm Irene in August 2011, was the worst the Passaic River Basin had seen in over 100 years and damage estimates are still being calculated. It is estimated that over \$1B in damages may have resulted from the March 2011 and August/September 2011 floods alone. From 1900 to 2011, more than 26 lives have been lost, \$5.5 billion in losses and

damages, and fifteen (15) Federal Disaster Declarations have been realized as a result of Passaic River Basin flooding. Further, if the 1903 flood of record, a 100 year event were to occur today, it is estimated that there could be up to \$2.4 billion in damages.

As part of this study, determination of Federal interest will be identified early based on existing information. The General Reevaluation will be completed in two phases: a Conceptual Phase and Detailed Analysis Phase. The Conceptual Phase will examine different combinations of comprehensive flood risk management alternatives through existing data, updated engineering and a comparison of economic benefits. Potential alternatives include looking at the impacts and costs of taking no action in the basin, which is a required by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), to looking at combinations of levees, floodwalls, channel modification, non-structural measures and bridge and dam modification. The study will also evaluate a new alternative that involves modifications to Beatties Dam and to the Two Bridges area. The Conceptual Phase will give the State an opportunity to determine which alternative(s) will be evaluated in the Detailed Analysis Phase based on conceptual costs and economics, environmental requirements, and public consensus.

You are respectfully requested to provide any pertinent information about the project area that would assist in the study and evaluation of alternatives. In particular, we request information on the type and amount of damages that have occurred from storms in recent years. The information provided will be used to the greatest extent possible to calibrate hydrologic modeling efforts to assess economic damages to determine Federal interest in providing flood risk management measures. We also request any information on natural resources including plants, animals, and particularly wetland habitats. Any assistance or suggestions pertaining to the conduct of this study is encouraged. 

TAKE NOTICE that, Public Service Electric and Gas Company ("Public Service", "the Company") filed a Petition with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities ("Board", "BPU") in July 2012 requesting a resetting of the Company's Electric and Gas RGGI Recovery Charges. Approval of this filing would increase rates to be paid by the Company's electric customers by \$61.5 million annually and would increase rates to be paid by the Company's gas customers by \$8.4 million These changes are the result of annually. adjustments in the various applicable components in the separate electric and gas RGGI Recovery Charges: Carbon Abatement Programs, Energy Efficiency Economic Stimulus Programs and Energy Efficiency Economic Extension Program for both Electric and Gas, and for Electric only, the Demand Response Program, Solar Generation Investment Program (Solar 4 All), and Solar Loan II Program. The proposed electric and gas RGGI Recovery Charges, if approved by the Board, are shown in Table #1.

The approximate effect of the proposed increase on typical electric and gas residential monthly bills, if approved by the Board, is illustrated in Tables # 2 and 3.

Based on the filing, a typical residential electric customer using 780 kilowatthours per summer month and 7,360 kilowatthours on an annual basis would see an increase in the annual bill

from \$1,336.60 to \$1,347.84, or \$11.24 or approximately 0.84%.

Under the Company's proposal, a residential gas heating customer using 100 therms per month during the winter months and 660 therms on an annual basis would see an increase in the annual bill from \$745.91 to \$748.09, or \$2.18 or approximately 0.29%. Moreover, under the Company's proposal, a typical residential gas heating customer using 160 therms per month during the winter months and 1,050 therms on an annual basis would see an increase in the annual bill from \$1,144.58 to \$1,148.06, or \$3.48 or approximately 0.30%.

The Board has the statutory authority pursuant to N.J.S.A. 48:2-21, to establish the RGGI Recovery Charges to levels it finds just and reasonable. Therefore, the Board may establish the RGGI Recovery Charges at a level other than that proposed by Public Service. Therefore, the described charges may increase or decrease based upon the Board's decision.
